## **Thailand: Lese Majeste Law Gone Amuck**

**January 20, 2024**: Bangkok, Thailand: A Thai Appeal Court has extended a man's prison sentence to a record 50 years for insulting Thailand's **King Maha Vajiralongkorn.** This is believed to be the toughest penalty ever imposed under the country's draconian Lese Majeste Law.

**January 19, 2024**: Thailand's **King Maha Vajiralongkorn** commuted the eight-year prison sentence of former Prime Minister **Thaksin Shinawatra** to 12 months, since the 74-year-old billionaire had 'accepted his crime and shown remorse', the Royal Gazette journal said on Friday.

Thailand has some of the world's strictest Lese Majeste Laws, and criticizing the king, queen, or heir apparent can lead to a 15-year prison sentence for each offense. Hundreds of people have been prosecuted in recent years under the law.

The man, Mongkol Bas Thirakhot, was originally sentenced in 2023 to 28 years in prison for social media posts deemed damaging to the king. "On Thursday, the Court of Appeal in Chiang Rai found Mongkol guilty of more violations of the Law and added 22 years to his sentence," said Thai Lawyers for Human Rights (TLHR) in a statement. The Law has a unique feature, whereby for each offense, like a facebook post, considered to be an insult to the king, it imposes a minimum sentence. The Court, in fact, awarded a lighter sentence because Thirakhot cooperated with the Court during its proceedings.

This month, a court is expected to deliver a verdict against Pita Limjaroenrat, the former opposition leader who had led the **Move Forward Party** to 151 seats in the lower house in the elections held in May 2023. He is accused of seeking to end Thailand's constitutional democracy with the king as head of state through Move Forward's election campaign to amend the royal defamation law.
